What is a school Travel Plan?

Definition:

"A Travel Plan is a document put together by a school or a group of schools which sets out a package of short, medium- and long-term measures to encourage more children, young people and staff to choose alternatives to the car when making the journey to school".

It signifies an all-round commitment to develop safer routes to school.

The need for travel plans has arisen due to growing concerns over:

- Increasing congestion associated with the 'school run'.
- Pupil health concerns concerning inactive lifestyles.
- The need for pupils to gain "road sense" and independence.
- Road safety issues and concerns partly generated by school run related traffic.
- Air quality and climate change.



1. AIMS

The aims of this travel plan are...

Examples:

- To increase awareness amongst pupils, parents and staff about the health, environmental and social consequences of there travel choices.
- To reduce traffic congestion around the school gates.
- Increase the number of children walking and / or cycling to school.
- To improve safety on the journey to school by reducing car use.

3. School Introduction

- (a) Location
- St. Peter's is a new school that opened in September 2018. We are located on the northern outskirts of Salisbury adjacent to the A345.
- (b) Where do your pupils travel from?

 The Majority of our pupils live within our catchment area (St. Peter's Estate). We have a significant proportion of pupils that travel from Wilton Hill Estate and from Fugglestone Red. A small number of pupils travel from further afield (e.g. Alderbury, Old Sarum, Tisbury).
- (c) Access to the school
 Children enter the school through one gate on Xanten Way. The site is spacious and easily
 accommodates waiting parents and pupils outside the classroom doors. There is pedestrian
 access from St. Peter's Estate and Fugglestone Red (and adjoining parts of the city). Children
 from Wilton Hill and further afield drive to the school through necessity, although there is an
 appetite for the proposed footpath from Wilton Hill to the estate. The original travel plan for
 the school assumed that all pupils would live within 1000m of the school and they would
 walk, scoot or cycle. Many parents that live on the estate drive, some that live within
 walking distance off the estate and those that live further afield drive to the school. There
 is very little provision for this method of transport.
- (d) School Times 8.30am-3pm Gates are open from 8.20-8.45am and 2.50-3.15pm

South Hills operate wrap around care from 7.30-8.30am and 3-6pm.

The school has 269 pupils arriving and leaving everyday!

4. Present Travel Patterns

Arrival

Children have access to a peg in a cloakroom for wet coats There is space to store personal travel items such as bike helmets. The school has 4 scooter/bike racks

Car parking

There are no issues with staff parking. Staff arrive and there is ample parking for them on site.

There are 8 parking bays near to the school for parents. The majority of our parents park on Xanten Way and in the adjoining bus turning circle. They mount the curb at times and this had led to parental anxiety about pedestrian access. Additionally, there has been one 'near miss' on Adlam Way. The local council were quick to work alongside Persimmons to implement traffic calming measures.

Cycling Access

Cycling is allowed

There are a number of secure and effective bike shelters.

The school offers bike-a-bility training to Year 6,

Road Safety Education

Road Safety is taught through PSHE. Prior to the pandemic, the local council led walk-a-bility sessions with our Year 1 pupils, scoot-a-bility in Year 4 and bike-a-bility in Year 6.

School Crossing Patrol

The only traffic on Xanten Way is people travelling to the school. The road ends at the school car park and there is only one path in use on Xanten Way. Ultimately, when the development is complete, there will be a second path which may merit a lollipop person. Adlam Way is the busiest road that pedestrians must cross to walk to school. The maximum speed limit is 30mph; cars arriving on and leaving Adlam Way often reach speeds in excess of 40mph and so, during 2019, Persimmons (in collaboration with the local council) built some traffic calming measures to slow down vehicles.

There are plans for a zebra crossing to be built before December 2022.

Travel Information

The school shares updates on footpaths from Wilton Hill and Fugglestone Red.


Is the school used out of hours?








2. How many children do you have at St. Peter's?








4. Why does your child travel to school that way? (Select multiple options if required.)






5. If you currently park in the mornings/after school, how long are you parked for?






6. What would be your ideal mode of transporting your children to and and from school?






7. If you currently drive to school, which days of the week could you feasibly walk to school?

7. Summary of Survey Findings and Consultations

- Pupils want to commute to school in ways other than cars, notably, scooting and walking.
- Parking is a major concern for parents, and is likely to worsen unless habits are changed.

8. Action Plan

Target 1: To encourage sustainable travel and reduce the number of journeys to school via car:

- Promote walking to school via a pupil led campaign.
- Encourage cycling/scooting to school
- Engage pupils in spreading the sustainability and environmental message.

Target 2: To promote road safety:

- Use online road safety materials to raise awareness.
- Support JRSO activity in school.
