Key vocabulary

City	A large human settlement with a cathedral.
Capital city	Where a country's government is located
Landmark	A notable/famous feature of a place.
Human Feature	A large feature that was built by people e.g. a road or bridge.
Physical Feature	A landform that occurs naturally on Earth, such as a river, hill or beach.
Map	A picture of a place, drawn from above.
Symbol	A mark that represents a feature on a map.
Similar	When a feature or aspect is the same.
Different	When a feature or aspect is not the same.
Aerial photograph	A picture taken from above to get a 'bird's eye view'
