Timeline

900	The Benin Kingdom was first created when lots of smaller villages joined together to form a larger community
1180	The dynasty of the 'Oba' begins and the Kingdom of Benin is officially formed
1440	The Kingdom of Benin began to expand and prosper under the rule of Oba Ewuare the Great
1451	Oba Ewuare expanded the kingdom and set up trading links with Portuguese visitors
1700	The Benin Kingdom entered a period of decline due to a series of civil wars and the ending of the slave trade in Europe
1897	Benin City is destroyed by British troops and Benin comes under British control

Key Facts

- Benin, in modern day Nigeria was an advanced society as long ago as a thousand years, in many ways more advanced than Saxon and Viking society at the time.
- It's really important to recognise how African societies such as Benin developed in their own right and not as a result of contact with Europeans. This helps combat some prejudices people have today thinking that all the important developments in world history took place in the West.
- Benin society was organised around the all-important Oba who lived in his own palace within a well-defended city.
- The society is best remembered for its magnificent bronzes.
- At the end of the Victorian period soldiers of the British empire clashed with the inhabitants of Benin and looted a vast number of these superb bronzes many of which are still held in British museums.
- The debate about whether the Benin bronzes should be returned

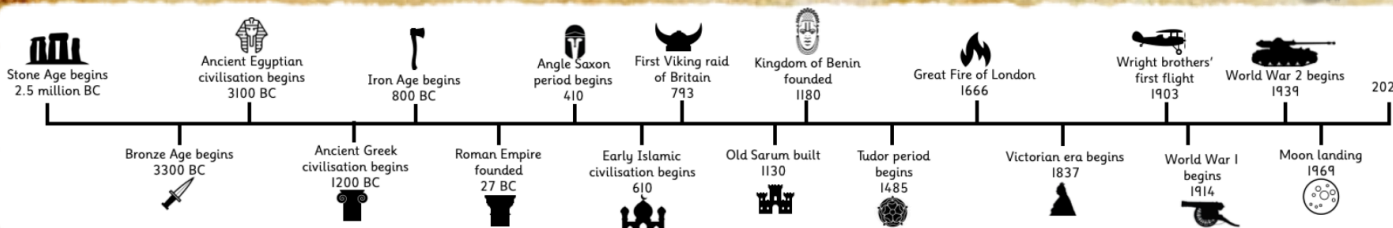
