St Peter's CE Primary Academy is a mainstream primary school, which is part of multi-academy trust, called Diocese of Salisbury Academy Trust (DSAT). We are committed to providing high-quality education for all children in our school. We believe that all children have a common entitlement to a broad and balanced academic and social curriculum which is accessible to them, and to be fully included in all aspects of school life.

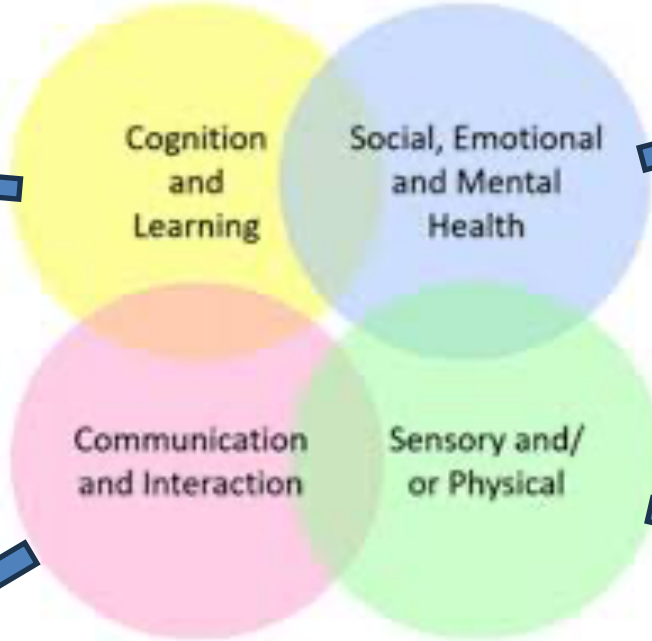
What is the purpose of this report?

The purpose of this report is to give parents, carers and children a clear understanding of the support available to them, as well as the processes that the school uses to identify and assess children with Special Educational Needs (SEN). In 2014, the government publish the SEN Code of Practice. This is statutory guidance for organisations that work with and support children and young people with SEN and disabilities. It is a set of guidelines that the DfE (Department of Education) say local authorities and schools must follow.

Types of SEND do we support at St Peter's?

Broad Areas of Need

This may include learning difficulties such as Dyslexia and literacy difficulties. It may include more general learning difficulties.



Children experience a wide range of social and emotional difficulties. This may manifest in certain behaviours. Children with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) or Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD) may have SEMH needs.

Children may have speech and language difficulties. They may find it difficult to say what they want, or understand what is said to them. Children may not understand/ use the social rules of communication. Children who are autistic often have C & I needs.

This may include a physical disability, a visual or hearing difficulty e.g. partial deafness or multi-sensory differences.

Main needs supported in the school in 2024-25

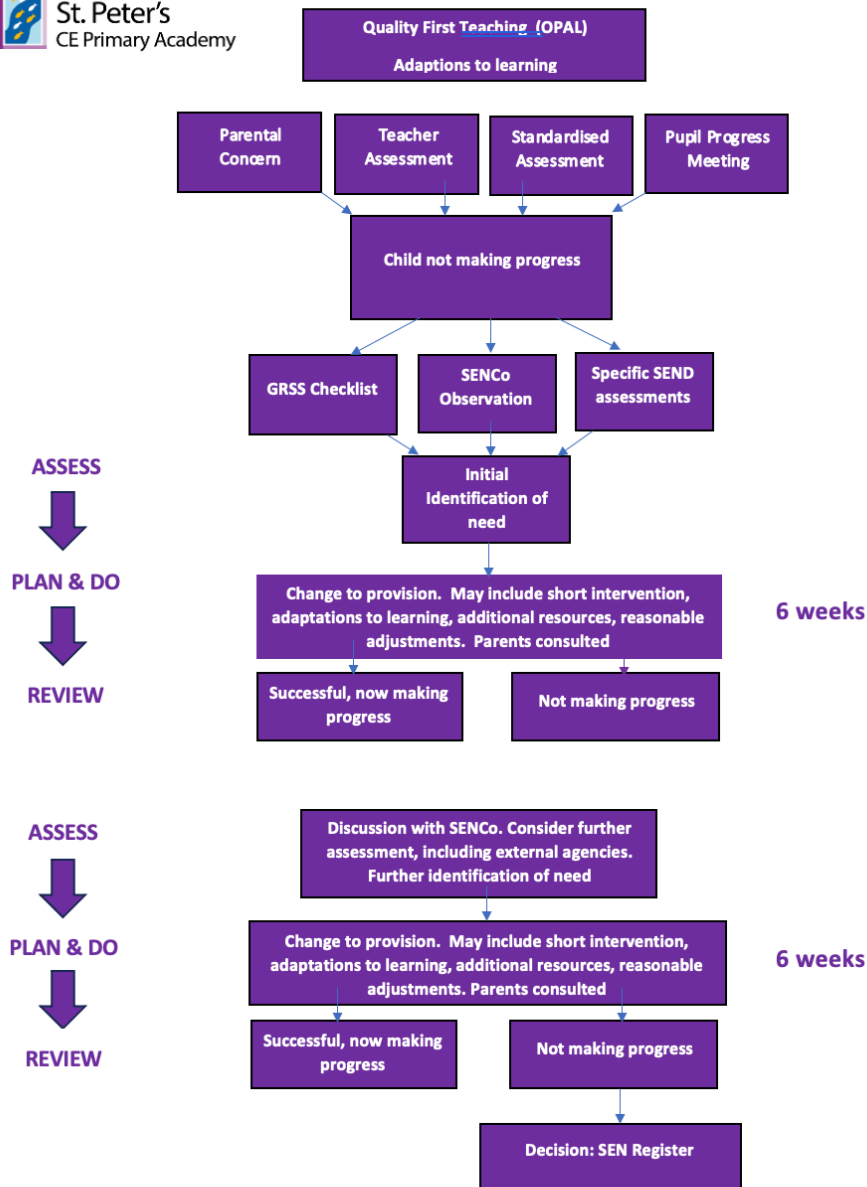
How do we know if a pupil needs extra help?

Teachers, with the support of the senior leadership team, make regular assessments of progress for all pupils. These may include standardised assessments as well as formative assessment of teachers and support staff, based on classroom practice.

From these assessments, it is possible to identify pupils who are making less than expected progress given their age and individual circumstances. Progress in all four areas of SEND are considered, i.e. appropriate development of speech and language, physical and sensory needs and social, emotional and mental health, as well as cognition and learning.

Typically, progress will be discussed at pupil progress meetings which take place three times/year. However, a teacher, parent or child may raise their concerns at any time. Following discussions with the SENCo (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Co-ordinator) and subject leaders, any areas of weakness are targeted through high quality teaching, which may involve adapting tasks and resources, providing additional adult support or intervention. This is discussed with parents.

Identifying SEND Pathway



Where progress continues to be less than expected, the teacher and class teacher assess whether the child has SEN. This may involve additional assessments by either the SENCo or external agencies. As well as NTS standardised assessments for reading, spelling, punctuation and grammar and maths, specific SEND assessments can identify specific areas of need. This graduated response is shown in the Identifying SEND Pathway below.

Occasionally, a pupil's needs were identified before they started school. When this occurred, we liaised closely with the pre-school setting and the Local Authority to ensure all the relevant information regarding the pupil and their needs was passed on to enable us to meet their needs successfully.

What is St Peter's approach to teaching pupils with SEND?

All children have the right to a broad and balanced curriculum that is relevant and adapted, and which demonstrates progression and coherence. As such, the school is committed to identify and support all pupils who experience difficulties and, subject to the overall constraints of the school budget, provide such children with the levels of resources to meet their curricular needs.

We take a person-centred approach to meet individual needs. We may use a wide range of different strategies and adaptations to maximise progress. This may involve adapting learning activities, providing different resources, including teaching support.

We adopt an Assess, Plan - Do – Review approach. Teachers plan for individual children alongside group planning, deliver in an inclusive environment and set new targets in response to learning.

The graduated approach is a 4-part cycle of assess, plan, do, review.



How do we monitor the progress of pupils with SEND?

Once a child has been assessed as a child with SEN and is not making progress in at least one of the four broad areas of need, teachers create a Pupil Learning Plan, which focuses on the child's primary area of need.

We gain the views of parents/ carers and pupils. This plan is intended to ensure long term outcomes are achievable through achievable shorter-term targets. The plans are reviewed termly in collaboration with parents and pupils.

Progress towards these targets is monitored by the class teacher, SENCo and Senior Leadership Team (SLT).

Education and Health Care Plan (EHCP)

A child who requires specific support in class and where progress and needs have not been met through a Pupil Learning Plan (as above) will be considered for an EHC Needs Assessment. Evidence is gathered from the parent/ carer, teacher and pupil and this is presented in an application which is put forward to the SEND Panel. At this point, the Local Authority (LA) will decide if the child needs to have an assessment or not. If an assessment is decided upon by the LA, further information is gathered, such as, an Educational Psychologist would come into school and complete further assessments. If the child is considered for an EHCP the child, at this level, will be allocated a SEND Lead Worker through Wiltshire Council SEND Service.

Who helps Mrs Roper help you?

Everyone at St Peter's wants to make school as positive an experience as possible for the pupils and parents. Below are a few friendly people who have had extra knowledge to help us provide successful provision for children with SEND.



Outside Agencies: Sometimes we need some advice from people outside of school. This year we have worked with an EP (Educational Psychologist) and the Wiltshire SENSS team. We have also worked with professionals from CAMHS as well as some organisations to help parents at home.

TA's: Our TAs work closely with the class teacher and SENCo to deliver interventions and monitor the pupils progress.



Forest School: Mrs Garriock is fully trained in supporting children's SEMH and communication and interaction needs through the use of the outdoor environment.

Parents: Parents know more about their child than we will ever know and are the best source of information and insight we have.



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Pupils: If we want to understand how to best support, we need to be talking to the children, which is why they are asked to come to every review (if they can).



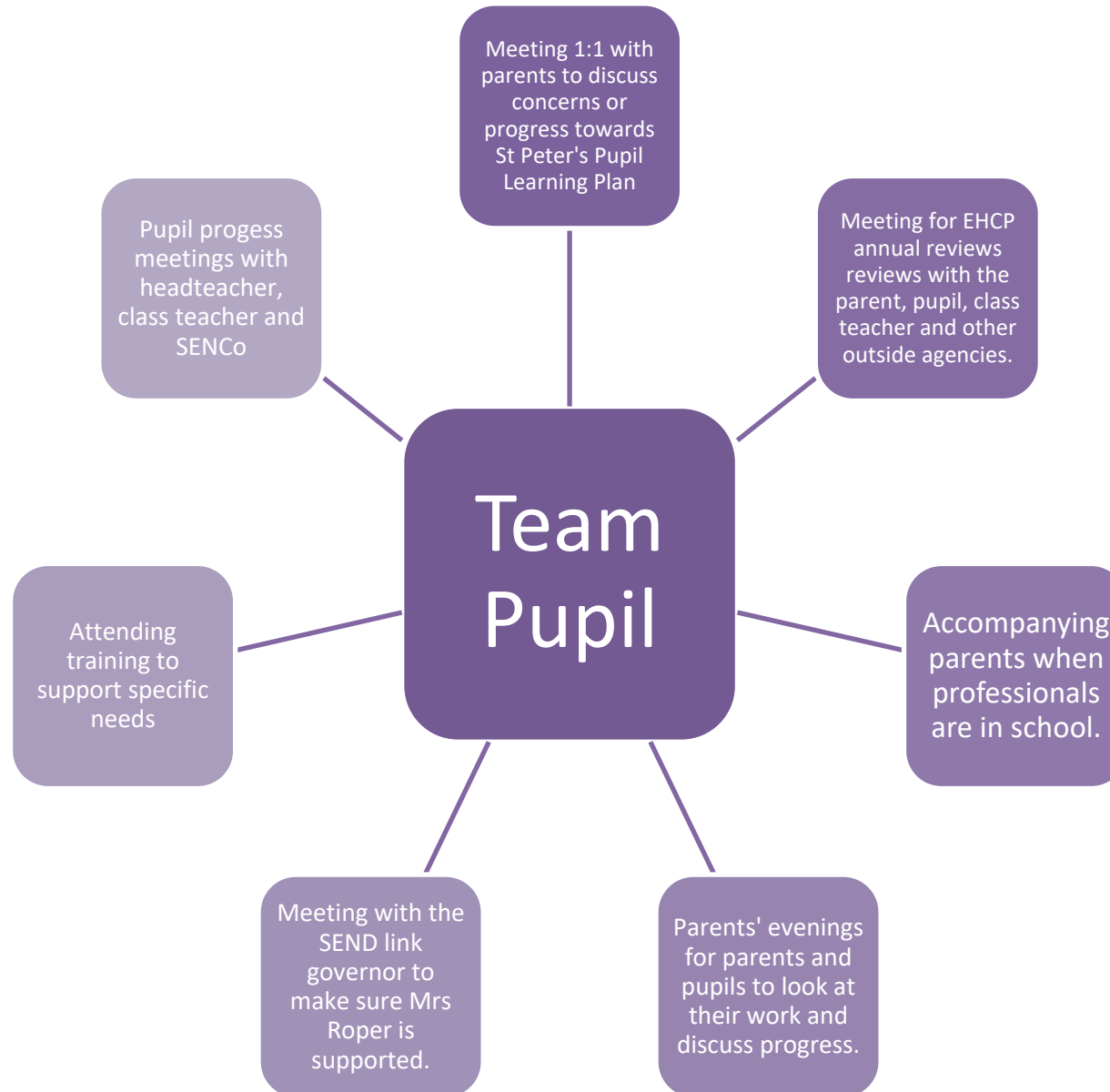
Teachers: Teachers are working with the pupils every day and are the people in school who know them best. They can effectively put provision in place to support them.

ELSA: Mrs Beha is fully trained in providing emotional and social skills support to children. She helps them to understand and express their feelings.



How do we work as a team?

Mrs Roper cannot do the job of SENCo without being part of a team. Here are just a few times St Peter's staff have collaborated to ensure the correct provision is in place for a child.



What else does Mrs Roper do to help pupils with SEND at St Peter's?



Transition: Working with pre-schools to ensure that all our pupils, particularly those with SEND transition as well as possible. Arranging to see them in their own settings first and organising extra visits for the pupils and for staff to ensure that all relevant information is passed on.

Arranging extra school visits to secondary schools to prepare children for their next stage and ensuring ongoing support for their smooth transition.



Supporting teachers: The class teachers lead the SEND process for pupils in their class as they are the professionals working with the parents and pupils everyday. It is Mrs Roper's role to support them in this and to provide support signposting staff to ideas, resources and other professionals who might help this further.



Diversity: At St Peter's we celebrate and embrace who we are, despite our differences, no matter what race, religion, gender, sexual orientation, age, nationality or Special educational need and disability. We promote this ethos throughout the school by engaging in Diversity days. A day to reflect on and learn about different cultures and ideologies.



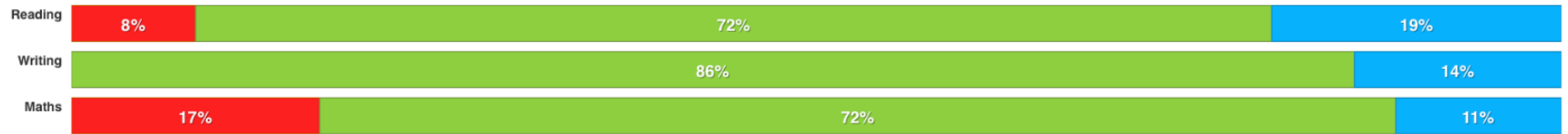
Complaints: If someone has a complaint regarding the SEND process, Mrs Roper would like to talk to them about it first, however if they can not come to an agreement then she would work through the official complaints process with them outlined on our website. It is also part of her role to make complaints to outside agencies if she feels that the other professionals are not providing the best support for the St Peter's pupils.
